For foodies

Geelong no longer just a stopover

Once known as simply the Gateway City from Melbourne to places such as Ballarat, Torquay, the Great Ocean Road and Warrnambool, Geelong is now a thriving, gentrified getaway for Melburnians, and a genuine holiday destination in its own right for interstate travellers, with many tourists coming from far and wide to experience the city's food scene.

No feast in Geelong is complete without eating at local institution Restaurant IGNI, nestled just back from

both Moorabool Street and Ryrie. Named for the Latin word for "from fire", the restaurant is based around a charcoal grill, but picky eaters beware; you won't find any menus at IGNI – the chef is in control here!

For a fresh perspective, head to the newly opened The Continental on the hip and happening Little Malop Street. Despite the restaurant being barely six months old, owner-operator Chris Taranto has plenty of experience, with familiarity of the food scene in both Geelong and

Melbourne. Food is available all night, as are drinks at the attached wine bar, with an extensive list of French and Italian drops.

After a more informal meal? Perhaps you've just washed up on the shores from a swim at Eastern Beach? Head to The Beach House Geelong: a seaside cafe tucked away in a 1930s heritage-listed former bather's pavilion. Sit beside a roaring fireplace with a multitude of outdoor tables, the menu offers classic dishes and Australian favourites – what's not to love?

Regional restart?

We may all soon be reaping the rewards for Australia's success in containing COVID-19, with Prime Minister Scott Morrison on Friday laying out potential phases as society takes its first steps towards returning to normal.

Initially slightly larger gatherings will be allowed, with cafes and restaurants to open in the first stage - but all being well, a few weeks later phase 2 will see regional travel allowed, within each

state initially but perhaps even interstate as early as July or August.

Indications are also looking positive for a trans-Tasman and Pacific "bubble" - so perhaps we may all be able to scratch that travel itch sooner than we expected.

Cruise pause

But what about cruising? Some of the world's major cruise brands last week made the difficult decision to suspend the majority of their Northern Hemisphere voyages for the upcoming

summer season. Holland America, Princess and Seabourn will not sail in Europe, North America or the Caribbean until close to Christmas, under current plans - but sister brand Carnival Cruise Line has made the first tentative steps to a return with August sailings from Galveston, Miami and Port Canaveral.

Cruise lines across the globe are also working hard on new health and safety protocols, and there is speculation some lines will place ships in each region to allow local cruising before international travel opens up.

Top 10 NZ North Island Experiences

Craig Tansley reveals the best experiences to try in New Zealand's North Island – from skiing to wine tasting, and everything in between.

Ride New Zealand's only skiable volcano

While the Queenstown region receives most publicity for its ski mountains, the North Island is actually home to the country's largest and highest ski areas – and you can ski both on the same pass. Both are on the stratovolcano, Mt Ruapehu. The two ski areas – Turoa and Whakapapa – receive the most snowfall of any New Zealand resort. And you'll be skiing within a World-Heritage-listed national park, with some of the most stunning alpine scenery in New Zealand.

Go wine tasting at Hawkes Bay

Hawkes Bay is New Zealand's warmest and driest region – which makes it ideal for touring through the country's oldest (and second largest) wine region. And you'll get to sample far more than the country's famous Sauvignon Blanc – because of its climate, the region is most famous for its big reds, like Cabernet Sauvignon and Syrah. There are 72 wineries here, you can take a bicycle wine tour (there's 200 kilometres of bike trails) between them. The region is also a foodie hotspot.

Surf one of the world's longest waves

While New Zealand doesn't strike you as a surfer's paradise, it's home to one of the world's most iconic waves. The town of Raglan on the west coast was etched into surfing folklore when the stars of *The Endless Summer* surfed here making their film in

1966. The wave can break down the line for nearly a kilometre. Raglan itself is also worth a stay – it's home to one of the country's best regional live music scenes.

Sail Auckland's harbour

Climb aboard a former America's Cup racing yacht on one of the world's most

famous harbours. Known as the City Of Sails, some of the America's Cup best skippers of all time honed their expertise tackling the waters of Auckland's Waitemata Harbour. There's a variety of sailing trips on offer, some which will take you further out into the Hauraki Gulf where you'll see whales and dolphins.

Beachcomb on Great Barrier Island

It's not far from Auckland but travelling to Great Barrier Island feels like you're going back in time. Seventy percent of Great Barrier Island is conservation land and some locals still live subsistently off the crayfish, scallops, kingfish and mussels the island's famous for. Not long ago there was no electricity on the island, but now you'll find some of the country's most charming lodges, like the eclectic Earthsong Lodge.

Chase the sun in the Bay Of Islands

They call this part of New Zealand "the winterless north". While most of us think of tall, white-capped mountains when we think of NZ, the Bay Of Islands is a boat lover's Mecca – there's 144 islands here all within a protected marine park, that's home to NZ's best beaches. It's also a big game fishing

hot-spot, and you can base yourself in an old whaling town built in the 1840s that was once the capital (Russell).

Play some of the world's best golf courses

Queenstown attracts most of the plaudits for its golf courses, but New Zealand's three best courses are all found on the North Island. Cape Kidnappers, built on top of towering cliffs on a lonely headland by Hawkes Bay is the world's 16th best course, while Kauri Cliffs in the Bay Of Islands forces golfers to hit across 200-metre-high drop-offs to the Pacific below (it's rated 49th). But all over the North Island, you'll find stunning courses, including Jack Nicklaus's The Kinloch Club just outside Lake Taupo.

Eat, drink and be cultural on Waiheke

Just a 35 minute ferry ride from Auckland's CBD, you'll feel like you've been transported to the rolling hills of Tuscany on Waiheke Island with its vineyards and olive groves. But these tasting rooms offer far more than Tuscany can: sweeping views from award-winning restaurants right out over the Pacific Ocean. Not only is Waiheke Island a food and wine lover's paradise, there's

a huge collection (for such a small island) of galleries and craft boutiques.

Indulge in the country's culinary capital

If Auckland is the City Of Sails, Wellington must be the City Of The Stomach. This is NZ's café and culinary capital – the whole CBD buzzes with restaurants and cafes home to the country's best coffee (CNN rates Wellington one of the world's top eight coffee destinations). And there's food markets that start Friday night and go all weekend, and over 20 craft beer breweries and bars, and look for laneways in the middle of the city that are foodie hot-spots.

Ease sore muscles along the Rim Of Fire

From as far back as the 1870s, Rotorua has been known as the wellness capital of NZ. The town lies within the Pacific Rim Of Fire, and is a geothermal hot-spot, with natural hot springs and mud pools right by the side of the road – many of them free-of-charge for visitors to soak in. It's also home to an impressive range of wellness centres and day spas, which all use the natural geothermal properties of the area for treatments.

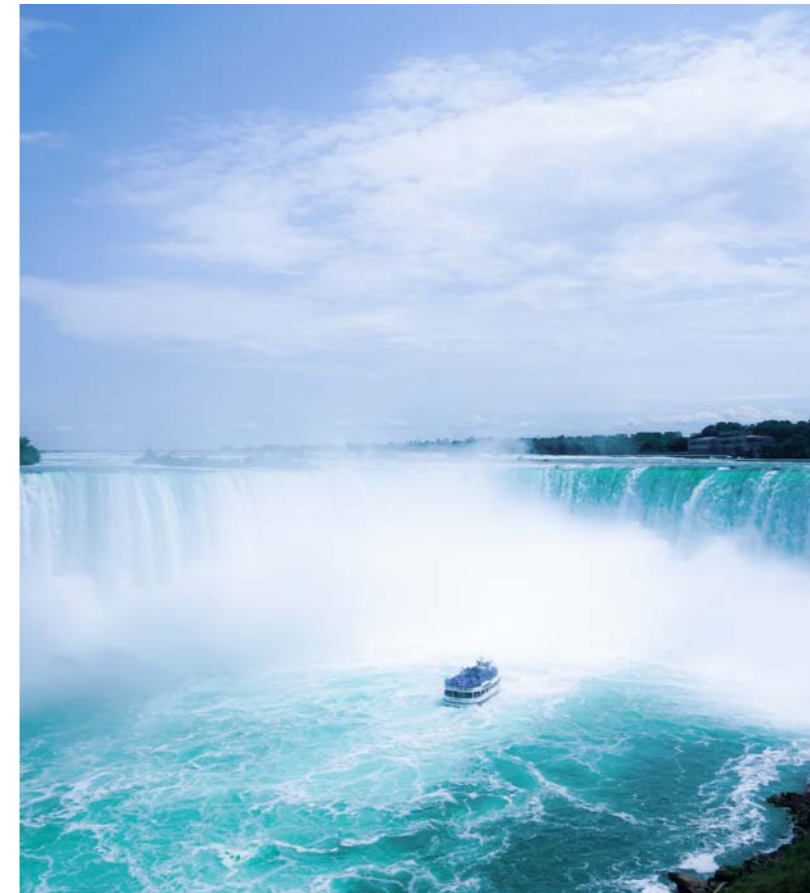
Take Four

Iguazu Falls

Named for the eponymous river on which it's located, Iguazu Falls is one of many dual-national falls, with a side accessible from both Argentina and Brazil. Claiming to be the largest falls in the world, Iguazu legend has it an enraged deity sliced the river in half, creating the Falls.



Niagara Falls

Whether you approach from the Canadian megalopolis of Toronto or the US cultural hotspot of Buffalo, do not miss out on Niagara Falls if you're in northeastern North America. The Falls can be enjoyed as a day trip from either city, or an overnight stay, with the nearby namesake Canadian city offering several stunning lodgings on Niagara Parkway. Don't miss a trip out to the falls on either *Maid of the Mist* or *Hornblower*. The boat ride to get up close and personal with the falls is definitely worth it, but prepare to get wet!

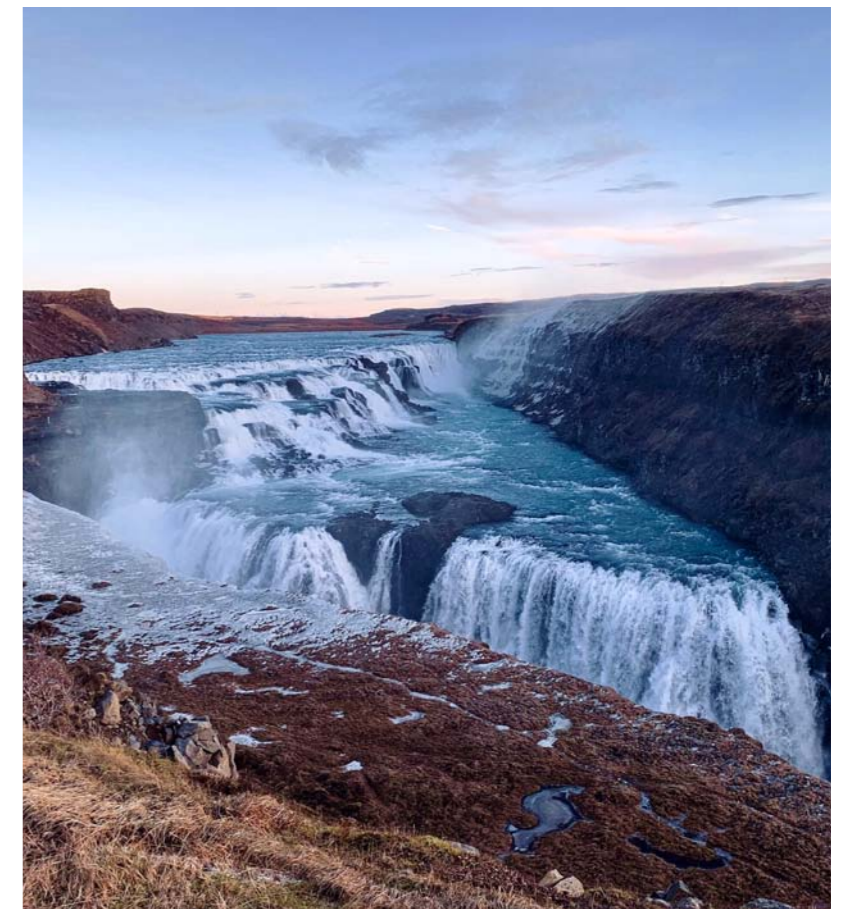
Victoria Falls

Located on the Zambezi River in southern Africa, Victoria Falls is also accessible from both Zambia and Zimbabwe. Aside from the fact it's one of the largest falls in the world, 'the smoke that thunders' also provides habitat for several unique species of animal to spot while you're in the area. Why not relax with a view as you spot elephants and hippos from a sunset cruise?



Gullfoss

Meaning "Golden Falls" in Icelandic, Gullfoss is a waterfall rising in popularity with increased visitation to the country, and for good reason. This unique waterfall is located in the canyon of Hvita, the "White River", making for some stunning photos. Forming part of Iceland's "Golden Circle", the awe-inspiring falls can be seen on a day trip out of Reykjavik, the nation's capital.

We didn't stop eating the whole time! We loved exploring the different specialty restaurants on the ship. Our favourite meal was sushi from Izumi, with mochi ice cream for dessert. The fresh pasta from Jamie's Italian was another favourite. As for snacks, we loved macarons from La Patisserie and pizza from Cafe Promenade.



Activities

The ship is huge and there are lots of different venues and activities to explore. Our favourite onboard activity was bumper cars in the Seaplex. We also enjoyed rollerskating, rock climbing, the Flowrider and iFLY. Some activities, like the iFLY and the Flowrider, were very popular so it was important to book early for those.

We enjoyed these activities with friends who we met around the ship and in the teen lounge. The teen lounge was open for ages 12-17 and was a great place to meet new friends and hang out together; there were other supervised spaces for younger age groups also.

Other fun activities were the silent disco, the Escape Room, trivia and karaoke competitions. We also enjoyed sushi and cupcake-making classes at Izumi and Jamie's Italian.

We loved watching the shows in the Royal theatre each night and the game shows. Our favourite was *Stars vs Stripes* which was a hilarious competition between the ship's officers and the entertainment team.

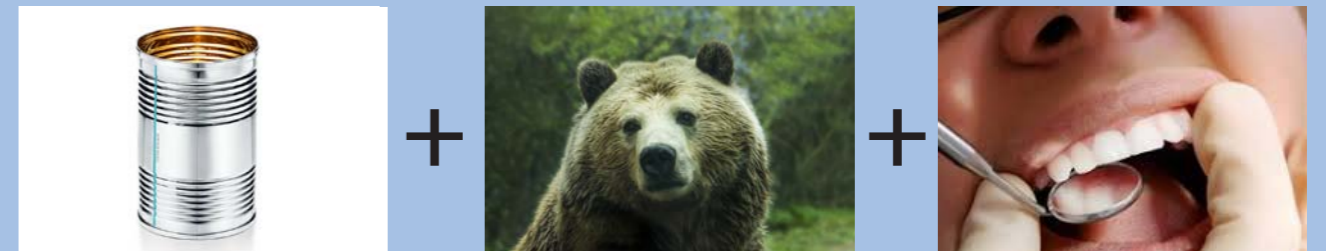

Swedish Meatballs

From Regent Seven Seas Cruises Culinary Arts Kitchen recipe book comes this recipe for delicious Swedish Meatballs, created by Chef Kathryn Kelly.

Ingredients

CRANBERRY SAUCE
4 cups fresh or frozen cranberries
1 cup unsweetened cranberry juice
Zest and juice of 1 lemon
Zest and juice of 1 orange
½ cup honey

MEATBALLS
1 pound ground veal
1 pound ground pork
1 cup fresh breadcrumbs
2 eggs, beaten
2 teaspoons kosher salt
1 teaspoon ground white pepper
1 teaspoon allspice
½ teaspoon cloves
¼ cup clarified butter
1 cup finely diced shallots
2 bay leaves
4 allspice berries
½ cup white wine
1½ cups heavy cream
½ cup veal demi-glace
½ cup sour cream

GARNISH
2 tablespoons finely chopped dill
2 tablespoons finely chopped mint
2 tablespoons orange zest

Method

MAKE THE CRANBERRY SAUCE In a medium saucepan over medium high heat, combine the cranberries, juices and zests and bring to a boil. Decrease the heat to medium-low, add the honey and simmer until the sauce thickens, about 15 minutes. Remove from the heat, taste and adjust the sweetness with additional honey if needed.

PREPARE THE MEATBALLS Preheat the oven to 375°F/191°C. Line a sheet pan with aluminum foil and top with an elevated wire rack. In a large bowl, combine the meats, bread crumbs, eggs, salt and spices and mix well. Form 18 equally sized meatballs. Place the meatballs on the prepared pan and let rest until set and room temperature, about 1 hour. In a large sauté pan over medium-high heat, sear the meatballs in the butter until lightly browned. Return the meatballs to the prepared pan and bake until they reach an internal temperature of 155°F/68°C. Remove from the oven and reserve warm. In the same sauté pan over medium heat, sweat the shallots with the bay leaves and allspice berries until the shallots soften and the spices bloom, about 3 minutes. Increase the heat to medium-high. Add the wine and stir to deglaze the pan, allowing the alcohol to evaporate and the sauce to reduce to a syrupy consistency. Decrease the heat to medium-low and remove the bay leaves and allspice. Stir in the cream and demi-glace and heat for about 3 minutes. Stir in the sour cream, return the meatballs to the pan and heat until warmed through, about 5 minutes.

TO SERVE The meatballs can be served over rice, noodles or mashed potatoes. Garnish with the dill, mint and orange zest and serve the cranberry sauce on the side.

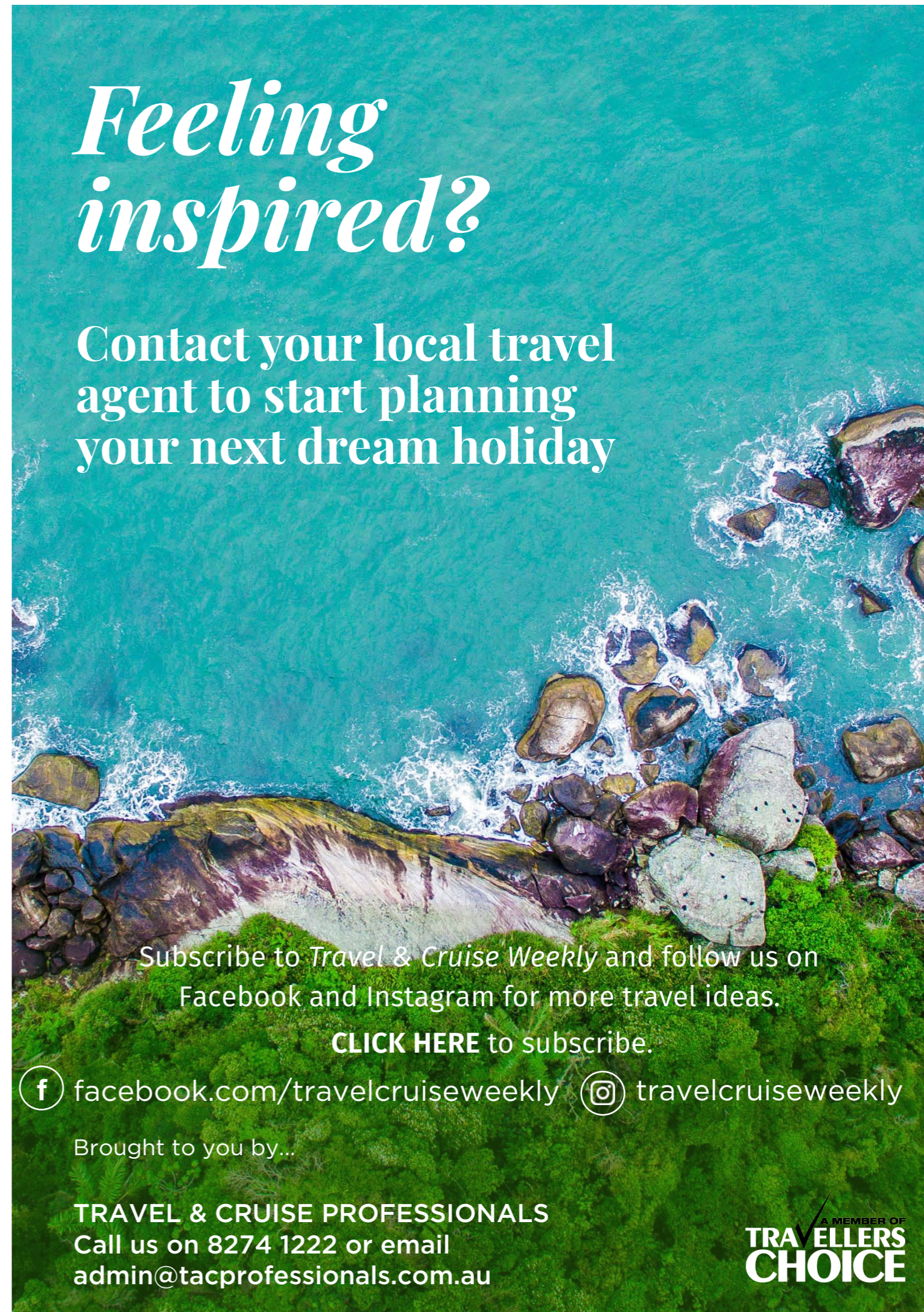
